- Identifying colours
- Mobility and getting around
- Braille

Magnifiers and lighting

Most visually-impaired people retain some vision, though different eye conditions can have different effects. There are several types of magnifiers and lighting that can help you make the most of your remaining sight.

Magnifiers

Magnifiers come in all shapes and sizes and can help with:

- Reading post, instructions, and labels
- Your hobbies
- Kitchen tasks, such as peeling vegetables, and seeing the controls on your cooker, microwave and washing machine

Magnifiers are available free of charge, through Low Vision Clinics. These are held monthly throughout Somerset. This service is provided by Optima Low Vision Services for the NHS. You can arrange appointments through your eye consultant, GP or Adult Social Care team. For more information about the service, and clinics in your area, contact:

Lighting

Good lighting can make a big difference to your vision. Although some people with sight loss do not like glare, many people benefit from brighter lighting in their homes.

It is important to have good central lighting in your rooms, with bright bulbs, shaded by pale lampshades. Additional lighting on the stairs and over kitchen worktops can also help.

As well as good central lighting, most people need "task lighting", for reading and other close work. Advice can be given on the most effective task lamps, which give a clear white light without glare.

This local voluntary society has a resource centre which sells different types of lamps, suitable for people with a visual impairment.

How to find out more about high technology equipment and specialist computer software

This equipment is increasingly being used by visually-impaired people in their homes. There are specially designed video magnifiers that magnify print to a large size on a screen. They enable people to read books, newspapers, labels and instructions. There are also machines that read printed material out loud.

This type of equipment is very expensive, and it is important to have advice about what is best suited to your needs. You can try out much of the equipment for 14 days to make sure it's right for you before you buy it. If you are on a low income it may be possible to get financial help from charities.

You can try out some high technology equipment at the local resource centre run by Somerset Sight.
