**in the Parish of Yeovil**  
**(Temporary Prohibition of Vehicles) Order 2020**

Somerset County Council in exercise of its powers under Section 14 (1) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 as amended, intends to make an Order, the effect of which will be to introduce the following temporary traffic restrictions as detailed in the Schedule below.

This Order follows an emergency notice to enable Somerset Highways to facilitate social distancing in shopping areas during Covid-19. This will come into operation on the 7<sup>th</sup> day of July 2020 and will remain in force for eighteen months.

The restrictions will only apply when indicated by traffic signs.

**Schedule**  
**Temporary Prohibition of Vehicles**

<b>High Street Yeovil</b>	For its entire length.
<b>Silver Street Yeovil</b>	For its entire length.
<b>Middle Street Yeovil</b>	From its junction with Union Street, westwards to its junction with Silver Street, for approximately 60 metres.
<b>Union Street Yeovil</b>	From its junction with Wine Street, northwards to its junction with Middle Street, for approximately 50 metres.

**Statement of reasons for making the Order**

- a) because of the likelihood of danger to the public, or of serious damage to the road, which is not attributable to such works  
or
- b) to facilitate social distancing in shopping areas during Covid-19.
